Interlaken Aug 25, 1916

My Dear Bernhard and Children: -

On looking about me this
morning I find this is a most
beautiful place. Had breakfast
at 7.15 with Hattie, Kereldine and
Sophie at the same table also
another Chicago woman
who's name I have already
forgotten, but there are
many friends here too.

Harry Goldstein, his
brother Arthur & family, Mrs
Ben Wolf and daughter also
a sister in law of Arthur's with
family. Two of Dr. Feleuthak's
daughters one married one
with her children and one
single one. Bella Eichenbaum
with her children and maid,
and the people from Oak Park
whom Louise spoke of.

There are many young
folks here, but all younger than
Edna although she would have

Minnoqua. I am sitting on the screened in porch overlooking the lake, and off of our rooms, we are in a bungalow, one story high with 6 rooms, three looking toward the grounds of which one is mine, and 3 overlooking the lake of which one is Hattie's with a door between, and she leaves her door from the porch open all night and a window on the porch too so you see I also get the lake air also. I have two windows and she has two in her room.

Every thing is very nice and cheap, the food could not be better, and because we had to go in to the second table for supper last night they saved us some delicious spring chicken from dinner, so you see we already had extras.

Hattie seems to be a favorite with the proprietress so I will be alright too - if we don't like

at Wilsons, and never tried it at home, and it dont work at all, there is one electric bulb in each room, and it is so high up that we must stand on a chair to light it and put it out, so you see one can hardly know the time without getting up and climbing at night.

I did not sleep much last night, but am not used to the noise, you see there are only thin partitions between the rooms, and you can hear your neighbors snore and even breath or talk so plainly also walk and wash.

When I get used to it I guess I will sleep better. Our trunks came last evening. Harry Kothetum said he has been fishing and it is fairly good, so if you intend to go fishing at all, come up here instead of to Lake Geneva. The lake is beautiful and boating and swimming is grand from all reports and appearances, so much more utilized than at

right at home. I hope the
chances of keeping house are
not too much for Beatrice.

Tommy owes you a nickel
if he has not payed it yet, don't
run up any bills with him
and pay the milkman each
morning. I hope Wolf's bill has
been payed. Remember me
to Rose and Mrs. H. Simons also
to all who ask. Love to Louisa
you may call her up and tell her
about this letter and tell her to
read it when she comes home
which I hope will be soon and often.

She would love it here with
Eleanor it is ideal, and some
lovely children Eleanor's age.

I will write to her next
but I can't any more now, and
I still have no cards.

Love to you all by the bushel
and many kisses. I hope Harold
is good and that none of them quarrel
and fight. I wonder if the baby misses
his mamma. Love to all from

top of the hill, after a few days
we can do so, but just now
everything is filled, many are
leaving Sunday, Sophie

also here. I must close now
my hand is getting cramped
I have written to Emma and

not seen the bathing beach yet,
it is stony down here, the
beach is further up. I hear motor
boats all the time and see the row
boats and you can hear almost all
the occupants every way out on the
water, the voices carry so clearly.
